#### **GUARDING AT THE TOMB**

While we are just entering the Lenten season, planning has already begun for our Guarding at the Tomb event. This function has grown in attendance every year and we hope that even more people will choose to participate.

St. Peter's holds a vigil that begins on the afternoon of Good Friday and goes straight



through to Easter Sunday morning with the church being occupied at all times. The intent is for people to attend either alone, in pairs or as a family and truly connect to God on a deep and personal level. People sign up for a one-hour time slot and will be alone in the church, with the doors locked, to sit in prayerful reflection and to be able to open their hearts to embrace the true meaning of Jesus' death and resurrection. Stations will be set up for you to read with activities for you to do along the way, but the time is yours to use however you choose.

A sign-up sheet will be posted on the Narthex bulletin board across from the sanctuary. If you are new to St. Peter's or are not familiar with this event, please speak with Cheryl or Larry Smola for more details.

#### FISHING FOR GOLD

In 2018, we were able to raise approximately \$2,250 for St. Peter's through Fishing for Gold. We want to thank everyone who participated.

We had 37 people join in the fundraiser with 25 winners. Eight of those numbers won multiple times. The most winning numbers were #2, #20 and #39; all of which won three times each. The highest winning number was #20, having won \$225.

For 2019, we are opening 75 memberships again so sign up quickly. Keep your old number or select a new one. If we reach the goal of 75, we will add another \$25 prize each month. There are 36 opportunities to win throughout the year with prizes of \$100, \$50 and \$25 every month.

For anyone not familiar with this fundraiser, it is this easy:

# - Each participant selects a number from 1 to 75.

- Every month for one year you agree to pay \$10 to be in "good standing". You can pay the entire \$120 all at once, \$60 semi-annually or even \$10 a month. By joining, you are committing to a year's membership. (You must be in "good standing" to win.)

- The first place winner receives \$100, second place \$50, third place \$25, and hopefully, a fourth place \$25.

- Drawings will take place the last Sunday of each month.

Memberships will be sold up to the last Sunday in March, which will be the date of the first drawing. Each Sunday, Joanna Sheffer and Debbie Francis will be in Fellowship Hall to receive memberships. The FFG fundraiser is open to friends and family so don't leave anyone out. Ask around!

### **MISSION SUPPORT NEWS**

Each year St. Peter's sends part of our offerings to our PA Synod (SEPA) and the national church (ELCA). Unless you are on a mailing list or stop and read the bulletin boards, you might not hear all that our gifts to mission support do.

Mission support provides 80% of the resources that enable the Lutheran Church to begin new ministries. One such ministry is in Philadelphia. In January, 2007, the Lutheran Church of the Holy Communion at 21<sup>st</sup> & Samson Streets in Philadelphia partnered with the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod which provided a part-time pastor's salary for six months so ELCA Pastor Violet Little could open The Welcome Center. In September, 2009, Pastor Little was installed as pastor of The Welcome Church–a church without walls in Center City that extends a special welcome to people experiencing homelessness.

In January, 2012, The Welcome Church was officially recognized by the ELCA as a congregation under development serving people in poverty. Today, in addition to Pastor Little and Associate Pastor Schaunel Steinnegal, a Presbyterian minister; there is a volunteer clergy team that includes a number of faith leaders from the Episcopal, UCC and other traditions. There are twice monthly outdoor services of Word and Sacrament at Aviator Park, across from the Franklin Institute, meeting on the first and last Sundays of each month, regardless of weather, followed by a coffee hour hosted by various congregations. They also have weekly gatherings at various churches in Philadelphia including "Tea and Talk"; "Prayer, Bible Study, and Holy Communion"; and, especially for women, "Chat and Chew"; "Sanctuary Angels"; and "The Well". The Welcome Church celebrated Maundy Thursday in 2011, washing the feet of people living on the streets in Center City. Pastor Little said in her homily, "...re-enacting the way Christ knelt and served his disciples reminds us that this is how all ministry begins – we get on our knees in prayer and reach our hands out to serve." After Holy Communion, Bishop Claire S. Burkat anointed the hands of participants in The Welcome Church's partnership, a venture with a local physician and Temple University's School of Podiatric Medicine to offer free foot care to the homeless community. In the group were Dr. John Scanlon, a local podiatrist and Chestnut Hill Hospital Chief Medical Officer who helped put the partnership together, Temple representatives, whose students will be part of street outreach teams, and the pastor of Arch Street Methodist Church which planned to house a drop-in podiatry clinic. Our tithing to SEPA and the ELCA has had a small part in carrying out God's plan and we can see the ripple effect our giving has accomplished in doing God's work in our world.

All of us know that regular exercise is good for us, but sometimes it is hard to find

the time to get to the gym or the energy to get that regular exercise that is so good for us. As Lent approaches, instead of thinking about what you can give up, try thinking about what you might add to your daily routine.



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
