After a one-week postponement, due to a dangerous sounding weather forecast, we met on Sunday, January 27. A quorum was had. The word "appreciation" would best describe the mood of the meeting. Thank you's were expressed all around, for work done and for congregational support. That doesn't mean that we didn't have any problems to discuss. We are still running a deficit and not everything we did was as successful as we might like, but there was an understanding of the commitment and great effort behind our ministry. One topic that received a lot of discussion revolved around the intention of the congregation to change the Council terms from 3 years to 2 years and to change the number of consecutive terms that a person can serve from 2 to 3. The thought is that the initial commitment, because it is short, will attract more members to try serving on Council and still allow them to serve for the same 6 year length of time, if desired, so that they feel they are making a valuable contribution to the organization and the ministry of St. Peter's.

We also discussed changing the starting date for each Council member to January 1. To make these changes, we need to change the Church Constitution. The vote to make these changes was approved.

We will meet again as a congregation on Sunday, February 17, for a Special Congregational Meeting to approve on second reading the constitutional changes.

We are also discussing several different service projects and those will be announced at a later date as the plans develop.












FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

News from Our Health Minister-Doris Sterner

... "Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh." Luke 6:21

How often do we connect humor to the church? The church, in the eyes of many, takes on an air of deep solemnity. There is, however, much to be said for recapturing the spirit of joy, humor, unity and healing. There has been consistent evidence that shows that laughter, over time, offers significant medical

benefits. It increases blood circulation and it reduces the stress hormone known as cortisol, so when you are laughing you are actually healing yourself. Laughter can boost the immune system, lower blood pressure and even regulate blood sugar. It also gives you some perspective when you are in the midst of difficult times. Fr. James Martin believes that Jesus' response to Nathanael making fun of Jesus' home town ("Can anything good come out of Nazareth?") shows He had a sense of humor. A joke can be a catalyst for healing and a source of divine joy. When was the last time you really laughed? What gives you joy?
