PENTECOST & CONFIRMATION

We hear the word Pentecost and we know that it has importance in Christianity but it's possible that not all of us could explain what it is to a non-Christian. It's the day that we remember and celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirt upon the earliest followers of Jesus.

When the Jewish community had gathered for Shavout, which is a harvest festival also commemorating the anniversary of the day when God gave the Torah to the nation of Israel, Peter stood up and preached his first sermon among the people. This is when he announced that Jesus had been raised and that the Holy Spirit had been poured out upon them. Peter urged the listeners to be baptized in the name of Jesus and to repent. It is written in the book of Acts 2:41 (NIV), "Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand were added to their number that day." That must have been quite the sermon!

Some say that Pentecost is the actual birth of the church because so many were moved and believed in Jesus as their savior that day. From a spiritual perspective, this is also an important day as the Spirit brings the church into existence and enlivens it.

How appropriate, then, that we will recognize the confirmation of six youths on Sunday, June 2, followed by a celebration of Pentecost the next Sunday, June 9. May they all be filled with the Holy Spirit that day and always! We are very excited to anticipate the many contributions they will bring forth throughout their spiritual journeys.



News from Our Health Minister, Doris Sterner

"Have mercy on me, Lord, for I am in distress." Psalm 31:9 NIV

More than one million Americans at or over age 40 are currently blind. Vision impairment creates problems for an additional 2.4 million. As Baby Boomers age, these numbers are expected to double. That means this is a problem for all of us. Blindness and visual impairment from many eye diseases and disorders can be reduced when detected and treated early. The leading causes of vision blindness and visual impairment include:

- Diabetic Retinopathy: This common complication of diabetes affects and impairs vision in nearly half of all diabetics to some degree over their lifetime. Blood vessels of the retina can break down, become blocked or leak. Effective treatment includes laser surgery and some medications. Diabetics require annual dilated eye exams.
- Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD): AMD is the most common cause of legal blindness and vision impairment in older Americans because it damages central vision. There is no generally accepted treatment, but laser therapies may reduce the risk of further vision loss.
- Cataract: This is the clouding of the lens of the eye and usually appears with advancing age but can be linked to smoking, diabetes and excessive exposure to sunlight. Surgical treatment can eliminate vision loss by replacing the eye's lens.
- Glaucoma: Vision loss is caused by gradual damage to the optic nerve which carries visual information from the eye to the brain. Vision loss is not noticed until significant nerve damage has occurred so screenings are important for early diagnosis when it can be controlled. Any vision loss cannot be restored.

We have a responsibility to care for our eyesight. God has given us our body and the resources to care for it. In I Corinthians 3:16 Paul tells us, "You yourselves are God's temple and ...God's spirit lives in you." In verse 9 he says, "You are God's field, God's building." By seeing our eye doctor regularly for vision exams and following our doctor's advice, we become good stewards of our bodies. We use the resources God has given us so we can become the extraordinary servants He intends us to be.
