"Hatch, Match and Dispatch!" Many years ago, a cynical pastor, a friend of mine, described the work of the pastor in those terms. So, what did he mean? He was suggesting that the People of God are most interested in having a pastor to "hatch", that is, to be there at the time of birth and to baptize the child, then to have a pastor available in order to "match", that is, to unite in marriage a couple that feels that they have found in the other their match, and finally, to have a pastor available to "dispatch", that is, to perform the funeral and burial services of church members.

The cynical pastor was not wrong about the congregation's wants or needs in a pastor under those circumstances, but I have learned that the pastor very often has the opportunity to grow to be a member of the church family. There is much more to what is asked of a pastor than "Hatch, Match and Dispatch" and much more for which a pastor feels wanted and needed.

SANCTUARY CHURCH

The ELCA's announcement of the intention of the Church to work toward being a "sanctuary church" has brought about some emotional responses, both negative and positive. Part of this is the result of a volatile political climate and the association of this announcement with one specific political issue, immigration. I don't doubt that the politics of the time brought this initiative to the floor of the ELCA Assembly, but I want to remind you of a long history of the church serving as sanctuary.

In its talking points the ELCA wrote this following sentence: "Being a sanctuary denomination is about loving our neighbors." Consider, if you will, the fact that we call the area of the church where we worship the "sanctuary". Historically, governments worldwide, except for the harshest of dictatorships, have honored the church's right to be a place of safety, to be a sanctuary. The idea is that the church is here to provide a safe place for its members, for those in need and actually for everyone.

The implications of the announcement have not been fully investigated, but it is my hope that the ELCA will put together a study document for congregations and members to read and discuss. I hope that anyone concerned about the announcement will feel free to discuss, here at St. Peter's, the ELCA's announcement and any documents produced to describe it. Usually such study documents provide the opportunity for congregations and individuals to ask questions and express opinions to an ELCA Task Force responsible for working on the document.

The ELCA and all of its congregations are made up of people with varying politics and perspectives on social issues. While the statements of our church should stand separate from politics, varying politics and perspectives make our church a richer and stronger body. Everyone's perspective is welcome and can contribute to any future statement made by the church. If the history of social statements goes as in the past, the resultant statement will be Biblically based and include elements that will cause it to be liked and disliked (a little) by the members of the ELCA. Hopefully the result will be reflective of our membership's Christian values, world need and, most important, the love and will of our Lord Jesus Christ.

News from Our Health Minister, Doris Sterner

"The human spirit will endure sickness; but a broken spirit—who can bear?"

- Proverbs 18:14 NRSV

Eating the right kinds of foods may give our brains what they need to avoid depression, or even to treat it once it's begun. When we are feeling depressed, sometimes the last thing that we think could improve our mood is our food. Surprisingly, researchers have been finding over the past decade that a healthy diet—one high in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, nuts, and seeds—can prevent depression. In contrast, a diet that is high in processed and refined foods actually increases the risk of depression for everyone, including children and teens. What's more amazing is that recent studies show that a healthy diet may not only prevent depression but could effectively treat it once it's started. One particular study showed that improving one's diet is significantly more effective in improving one's mood than what social support can do. Another study showed that the boost in mood that came from an improved diet was not temporary, but lasted the duration of the six month long study. Those and other recent findings are spurring the rise of a new field: nutritional psychiatry.

Depression has many causes, but it's really about an unhealthy brain. A poor diet makes depression worse by failing to provide the brain with the variety of nutrients it needs. Processed and deep-fried foods often contain trans fats that promote inflammation, which is believed to be a leading cause of depression. So what should we eat to support a happy and healthy brain? A diet comprised primarily of fruits and vegetables, healthy fats such as extra-virgin olive oil, legumes, nuts and whole grains will boost your mood. The complexity of the plant-based diet will provide the nutrition our brain needs, regulate our inflammatory response and support the good bacteria in our gut. A healthy diet has no negative side effects, unlike antidepressants, and it can prevent other health problems, such as heart disease, obesity and diabetes.

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS

One of the most efficient ways to give to charity is available only to those ages 70 ½ and older. It is known as the qualified charitable contribution (QCD) made directly from your IRA. Under a QCD, the charitable contribution made from an IRA is not included in the gross income of the IRA owner. Nor does the owner take a deduction for the contribution. In addition, the QCD counts toward the required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year.

A distribution must meet certain requirements to be a QCD. The charitable contribution must be made directly from the IRA custodian or trustee to the charity. QCDs are limited to no more than \$100,000 annually, no matter the amount of your RMD for the year. The IRA owner should have documentation in writing from the charity acknowledging the amount and date of the contribution.

Every act of faith tends to enrich the one who makes it. For most people, it is an act of faith to contribute a significant portion of their incomes to the programs of the church. Developing adequate faith for tithing is certain to bring deeper involvement in and stronger commitment to the church. Great spiritual enrichment will result.
