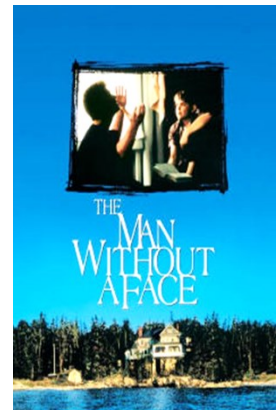

### ***THE PRINCIPLES OF STEWARDSHIP***

- Being a **responsible steward** is our way of acknowledging and showing faith in the Gospel. This involves how we treat ourselves, our family and our friends.
- Being a **self-sacrificing steward** is based on the self-sacrifice of Christ. For our sake, Jesus gave up everything to make us rich through the cross and the resurrection. We, too, are called to sacrifice so others may share in God’s Word and blessings.
- Being a **willing steward** means each of us has been moved by the Holy Spirit and are prepared to give. We are to give of our time, our talents and our resources.
- Being a **sharing steward** recognizes the gifts each person has received from God and each person’s relationship with Jesus Christ and members in the Body of Christ. We are to develop and share these gifts with others.
- Being a **proportionate steward** is our way of giving in relation to our abundance. We are to give according to our “means”, not according to our budget or income.
- Being a **committed steward** means making a statement about your intent to fulfill your role as a steward. As members of a church family, we are asked to make a commitment of our time, talents and resources to the ministry of Jesus Christ
- Being a **regular steward** means practicing our stewardship on a daily basis. By doing so, this becomes a lifestyle.
- Being a **genuine steward** means putting your faith into action. This is the tangible demonstration of what is sincerely in our hearts, not simply a verbal expression.
- Being a **challenged steward** recognizes the dynamic nature of our faith. As our faith grows so will our blessings and our responsibilities.

## ***NEWS FROM OUR HEALTH MINISTER, DORIS STERNER***

**“Health and fitness are better than any gold, and a robust body than countless riches. There is no wealth better than health of body, and no gladness above joy of heart.” Sirach 30:15-16**

Preventing heart disease not only happens at the kitchen table and at your local gym, but your heart also receives great protective benefits from sleep. Adequate amounts of good quality sleep are essential to your heart and blood vessel health. A recent study of more than 54,000 individuals found that individuals who experienced difficulty falling asleep, or staying asleep, and did not wake up feeling refreshed in the morning more than tripled the risk for heart failure.

Insufficient or interrupted sleep increases white blood cells and inflammatory compounds that accelerate atherosclerosis or plaque build-up in the arteries. Adequate sleep helps to reduce our cardiovascular risk factors such as elevated cholesterol and blood fats, obesity and diabetes. During normal, good quality sleep, your blood pressure goes down. In contrast, experiencing sleep shortage means that your blood pressure stays higher for a longer time, causing damage over time.

Here are some ways to get good, heart-protecting sleep:

- Follow a regular sleep schedule, averaging 7 to 8 hours per night
- Limit your exposure to bright and blue lights before bedtime
- Use bright light in the morning and engage in daily, moderate exercise
- Keep your bedroom cool and completely dark with fresh air
- A tub bath with lukewarm temperature and a few drops of lavender essential oil helps prevent insomnia by calming the sympathetic nervous system

Persistent sleep problems are nothing to ignore. See your doctor and a sleep specialist if none of these suggestions helps you gain restorative sleep.

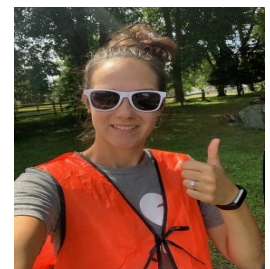

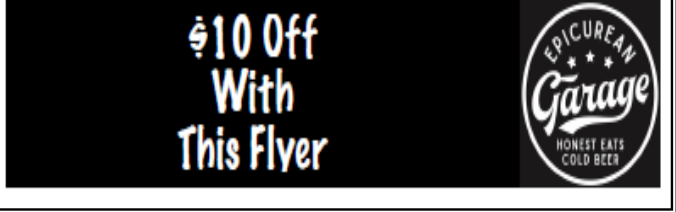

So, naturally I assumed you had stolen the car."
