November 1 is All Saints' Day. We will celebrate it as a church during our worship on November 3. Different people understand this day in different ways. Some traditions emphasize the "saints", meaning those who have been lifted up as saints because of their extraordinary lives or special acts. Some traditions turn All Saints' Day into a kind of religious Memorial Day concentrating on their deceased family and friends. Other traditions focus on those who currently make up the Body of Christ, the members of their congregations (and other church members) as the saints of Christ and remind one another that we are saints because Jesus made us saints through his righteousness. Sometimes we do not act all that "saint-like" to those who emphasize an understanding different from the one we hold.

As Lutherans, we recognize all of these understandings but emphasize most, at least in our theology, that we each are both saints and sinners. We recognize each of us as saints, not because we are such great Christians, but because Jesus cleansed us of our sins making us saints.

All Saints' Day and Sunday become a celebration of Jesus' wonderful sacrifice and God's mercy for us. Because of this, we remember all of our deceased loved ones, trusting in Jesus' forgiveness and God's mercy, so that these loved ones, called saints, we celebrate as living new lives with our Lord. The saints of special renown we recognize because of their examples which help us to live more responsive lives to God's love and will, but we always recognize that, as great as they may have been, they were like us saints and sinners, dependent upon Jesus' sacrifice for their forgiveness and God's mercy for salvation. They are human and flawed like every other human being.

We will sing the hymn "For All Your Saints, O Lord" on November 3, remembering and acknowledging ourselves as saints, those around us from our church and others as saints, and those living and those who have died in the Lord as saints.

STEWARDSHIP NOTES

One of the most efficient ways to give to charity is available only to those ages 70 ½ and older. It is known as the qualified charitable contribution (QCD) made directly from your IRA. Under a QCD, the charitable contribution made from an IRA is not included in the gross income of the IRA owner. Nor does the owner take a deduction for the contribution. In addition, the QCD counts toward the required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year.

A distribution must meet certain requirements to be a QCD. The charitable contribution must be made directly from the IRA custodian or trustee to the charity. QCDs are limited to no more than \$100,000 annually, no matter the amount of your RMD for the year. The IRA owner should have documentation in writing from the charity acknowledging the amount and date of the contribution.

NEWS FROM OUR HEALTH MINISTER, DORIS STERNER

November is National Alzheimer’s Disease Month. Alzheimer’s disease is the most common cause of dementia in older people. Dementia is a medical condition that disrupts the way the brain works. It affects the parts of the brain that control thought, memory and language. The disease usually begins after age 65 and the risk of Alzheimer’s disease goes up with age. Alzheimer’s disease begins slowly. At first, the only symptom may be mild forgetfulness. People with Alzheimer’s may have trouble remembering recent events, activities or names of familiar people or things. Simple math problems may become hard for these people to solve. As the disease progresses, people with Alzheimer’s may forget how to do simple tasks like brushing their teeth or combing their hair. They can no longer think clearly, and begin to have problems speaking, understanding, reading or writing. Later on, people with this disease may become anxious, aggressive or wander away from home. Eventually, patients may need total care. The course of the disease varies from person to person; some people may have the disease only five years, while others may have it for as many as 20 years.

BREAKING DOWN WALLS

Our society is so divided today that I felt uncomfortable carrying over the title of the celebration being planned for Saturday, November 9. The full title is "Breaking Down Walls, Lord Tear Down All that Divides Us." Many churches are being asked to plan services to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the tearing down of the Berlin Wall. Here at St. Peter's, we will recognize this event at our regular service on Sunday, November 10. I remember the celebration that took place in Berlin when the walls started being torn down. I remember seeing people standing and sitting on the top of the wall or on the top of broken sections of the wall. The Berlin Wall was the symbol of a divided Germany. As the wall came down, assisted by many who held it in contempt, families who had been separated for nearly 45 years were able to reacquaint themselves with brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles, some of whom lived just a football field or less away. While the result of the wall's demise was the unification of Germany, it is the personal benefit to families and friends that is most worthy of our celebration as Americans. The interesting thing about the Berlin Wall was it was built as much to keep the residents of Eastern Germany from leaving as it was to keep others out. That says a lot about the conditions in Eastern Germany.

I'm not a fan of walls, except for those which support the roof over my head. But I understand how, especially in the past, walls were built to protect us. High walls could protect a people from swords, spears and arrows. Physical walls today do little to protect us, since computers, planes, drones, helicopters and new technology cannot be restricted by physical walls. Walls can keep some people out or in and can stem the tide of a mass invasion, but our greatest dangers today are technologically produced. Last I heard there are discussions about taking down the wall in Belfast, Ireland, which separates the Protestants from the Roman Catholics. The one wall which I hope will be preserved is the Great Wall of China, not for its use as a wall, but for the amazing achievement of its construction in the time when it was built.

As a pastor, I am called to break down a different kind of wall. The walls that I try to break down are the most impenetrable of all walls, the emotional walls that we build to keep us from being hurt by others and keep us from opportunities of love. So many of our families are divided by such walls and, even within the church, certain members have built such emotional walls to keep others away. So much is lost. There is so much love to be shared. How can we as the Body of Christ justify being divided by emotional walls, beliefs and outside allegiances. It's bad enough that denominations have set up walls which stand between other Christians. We need to make sure that within our church and within our families we are setting an example to those outside of our community of a willingness to be open to one another and to share the love of Jesus with everyone.
