## DO NOT BE AFRAID

### *Evangelism is easier than you think!*

When we initially thought of Evangelism, it conjured up images of the prophets in the Bible standing on corners and shouting the word until the authorities dragged them off to prison or of preachers such as Joyce Meyers, Billy Graham, Beth Moore—those who make or made big names for themselves publicly with the Word of God.

Evangelism does not need to be that way. It is as simple as talking to your neighbor, co-worker, friend or family member, when the conversation comes up naturally. There are a few ways to evangelize in a safe manner that will not offend others:

- Show love and compassion to all you meet, even those who appear to be marginalized.
- Commit acts of kindness without expecting anything in return and always be willing to help others in a time of need (as long as it is not at the expense of your own health and well-being).
- While talking about your weekend plans, bring up the fact that you are going to church on Sunday. Don't be afraid to let them know the location of your church and invite them if it feels comfortable. If your church is having an event on a Friday or a Saturday evening, include that as a way to bring God into your environment.

Evangelism is the act of sharing the Word of God and it can be done in any method possible. With this age of social media, you have the option of Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, etc. And you can share your story one-on-one or invite people to church. The important thing is to not be afraid and when you feel that nudge from God, don't ignore it!

## NEWS FROM OUR HEALTH MINISTER, DORIS STERNER

**“Yet I said to myself, ‘This is my sickness, and I must endure it.’” Jeremiah 10:19**

Pneumonia is an infection of one or both of your lungs. It affects the air sacs of the lungs or the alveoli. As these air sacs become inflamed and infected, they fill with fluid, making breathing more difficult and reducing the flow of oxygen throughout your body. Cases range from fairly mild to dangerously severe. Seniors and children under 5 are most affected by its complications. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 1 million people in the U.S. are hospitalized from pneumonia each year. Pneumonia can be caused by bacteria or viruses, affecting treatment choices.

It can be hard to tease out whether symptoms you’re experiencing are due to a common cold or pneumonia, and if you need to be seen by a doctor. It is the length of time symptoms persist that can alert to the need to see your physician. Pneumonia symptoms can include: cough that persists; purple to cough with greenish/yellow phlegm; blood-tinged phlegm; fever and chills; wheezing; breathing difficulty; night sweats; nasal flaring and rapid breathing in infants; chest pains; general malaise or decreased energy; appetite loss.

Pneumonia that’s treated at home typically involves oral medication and supportive measures. Antibiotics are used to treat bacterial pneumonia. Usually within 48 hours of antibiotics you will start feeling better. Experts emphasize the importance of taking antibiotics as prescribed and finishing the entire course. Completing the antibiotic course helps prevent any remaining bacteria from becoming drug-resistant. Viral pneumonia does not respond to antibiotics and antiviral medications like oseltamivir (brand name Tamiflu) may be prescribed. Supportive measures including over-the-counter medication such as ibuprofen or acetaminophen to reduce fever, staying hydrated, a cough suppressant and rest are helpful.

### STEWARDSHIP NOTE

The people of St. Stephen’s, New Kingston, encountered Jesus camping in their picnic pavilion and followed him into ministry at a truck stop down the road. Michael, the man they met, told Pastor Matthew Best that there were many like him, living out of their cars at the Flying J because of its showers and laundry facilities. With the cooperation of the truck stop manager, the congregation began a ministry that includes help with laundry, assistance navigating social services and shared meals with laughter and honest conversation. Along the way, they have learned much about homelessness, the startling ease with which it happens and the difficulty of escaping the cycle that traps more than 15,000 Pennsylvanians who lack permanent shelter on any given day. The congregation can speak to the issues that perpetuate that cycle and is working with community leaders to meet immediate needs and address underlying issues.

“Serving at the truck stop is how we live out our faith,” said Best. “Advocacy is part of this ministry. It moves us from just trying to make sure people are clean and fed, to asking the question, why are people hungry and in need of a shower and laundry? We have an opportunity to advocate on behalf of people who are ignored by society, so that their voice can be heard and our society can be changed. It’s really about participating in the unfolding of the Kingdom of God in our midst.”

LAMPa (Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania) advocates for wise and just public policies in the state of Pennsylvania that promote the common good and equips Lutherans to live out their baptismal call to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.
