As we are all adjusting to the new "normal" of late, we have had to also alter the way we "visit" with family and friends, conduct business meetings and even teach our children. In some ways, this quarantine has made us appreciate the simpler things in life. During this time, it has taught us to become more focused on the basics and not be so busy with the world's distractions. Most likely, there have been a lot more sit-down dinners around the family table where good conversations and laughter have been shared.

Easter came regardless of the virus and the restrictions in place. Easter was celebrated, albeit not what we've grown accustomed to over the years with our normal traditions of going to church and having family and friends over, but it was celebrated. Our Easter Vigil is another tradition that our congregation has come to enjoy and, while it wasn't the same as physically being in the church sanctuary, it was made available for people to read through at home. The important thing to remember through all of this is that Easter isn't just one day; it is for a lifetime. It is a belief and a faith that our Lord died, was buried and then rose again; all for the sake of our sins.

Cathy and Pastor Wesemann both shared the following message they had received from family members and it is powerful to contemplate:

"The very first Easter was not in a crowded worship space with singing and praising. On the very first Easter, the disciples were locked in their house. It was dangerous for them to come out. They were afraid. They were living in a time of such despair and such fear. If they left their homes, their lives and the lives of their loved ones might be at risk. Could a miracle really have happened? Could life really had won out over death? Could this time of terror and fear really be coming to an end?


Alone in their homes they dared to believe that hope was possible, that the long night was over and morning had broken, that God's love was the most powerful of all, even though it didn't seem quite real yet. Eventually, they were able to leave their homes, when the fear and danger had subsided, they went around celebrating and spreading the good news that Jesus was risen and love was the

most powerful force on the earth. This year, we might get to experience a taste of what that first Easter was like, still in our homes daring to believe that hope is on the horizon. Then, after a while, when it is safe for all people, when it is the most loving choice, we will come out, gathering together, singing and shouting the good news that God brings life even out of death, that love always has the final say! This year we might get the closest taste we have had yet to appreciate what that first Easter was like." (*Author unknown*).

The theme for the vigil this year was "Being in Close Relationship with God" and tearing down the walls that we build throughout our lives. It seems so appropriate now that while we are in quarantine, we can build closer relationships during a time when things are a little less hectic in our lives and we can allow ample time for our relationship with God.

### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

It is a strange thing to look at the current Coronavirus situation and how it has affected our congregation and the life of my family. To my knowledge, no one from our congregation has become ill from the virus. Although the illness has touched two of my family members (that I know of), they were very ill but not hospitalized or incapacitated by the virus. I honestly feel that we, as a congregation, as well as me and my family, have been blessed to be able to function well in the midst of this pandemic. In truth, I am not one to blame God for bad things and I will not blame God for this virus, but I do think that God has given us the ability to make the best of such situations. As a church, while we have had to readjust our worship procedures because of the pandemic, we have made worship still possible. And I have been amazed by the number of people who have watched in real time and later watched each Sunday service as a video (572 and 319 and 333 and 568 and 418) since we started. We could not fit that number of people into our church. It is great to see so many people willing to gather for worship and to listen to God's Word and the message of Jesus Christ, even if they are in their homes.

Members of St. Peter's, we should remember that our church survived and served our community during the Revolutionary war, the Civil war, the Spanish flu, the First and Second World wars, the Korean war, the Vietnam war with its anti-war protests, the upheaval around the Civil Rights movement, 911 and numerous other traumatic and life-changing events. Our ministry continues to move forward using the things that we have learned all along the way. It seems that we still have much to learn and much to do. I am happy to say that we are blessed to be a blessing to others.

Because of the Covid-19 virus, many events we typically hold have been cancelled until further notice. For some events, however, we are finding ways to improvise.

- The 2020 Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod Assembly of the ELCA has been cancelled.
- All worship services are being livestreamed on Facebook. We held our first Zoom Fellowship Hour with 26 members in attendance.
- Bible study has been temporarily cancelled until we can find a way for all of our members to participate.
- Attending the Sight & Sound theatre in Lancaster to see Esther has been cancelled.
- The majority of our church meetings have been cancelled. The Executive Committee and Church Council have met through an internet program that allows those involved to interact with each other from their own homes.
- Movies & Faith has become a Zoom meeting.
- Sunday School was cancelled pending the pandemic restrictions lifting but is now on Zoom on Wednesday afternoons.
- The Youth Group has reconnected virtually and is holding "hangouts" with each other online.

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### News from Our Health Minister, Doris Sterner

#### "Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you." 1 Peter 5:7

May is Mental Health Month. Mental Health America and their affiliates have led the observance of May as Mental Health month since 1949. This year's focus is on resilience—something we all need to successfully move through this difficult time because of the coronavirus and what it has brought. All of us are now dealing with some associated worry, isolation, perhaps loneliness and anxiety. COVID-19 is new and presents a situation that none of us could have imagined a few short months ago. It is extremely contagious and has resulted in business closures, social distancing and quarantine measures which disrupt our daily lives. There are many reasons that you might be worried: afraid of getting sick or passing the virus onto others, financial stress, not being able to connect with friends and family, shortages among others. So many things that are out of our control.




Focusing on the things that we can control can provide some comfort and a path to reducing anxiety. We can control our minds and bodies by keeping a healthy diet, exercising at home, getting enough sleep and taking care of our mental health. We can control our immediate environment by limiting the number of people we come into contact with, washing hands often and using a hand sanitizer when soap and water is not available and cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched surfaces. Furthermore, we can reach out to friends via phone calls, video chats or text; use a meditation or mindfulness app; set a timer for every hour to get up and stretch or take a walk; read the Bible and pray; take 10 deep breaths when we feel stressed. There is help if you are experiencing emotional distress related to the COVID-19 pandemic—you can call or text a crisis counselor 24/7 at 1-800-985-5990 or text "TalkWithUs" to 66746.

# **Mother's Day**

The modern holiday of Mother's Day was first celebrated in 1908, when Anna Jarvis held a memorial for her mother at St. Andrew's Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia. Her campaign to make Mother's Day a recognized holiday in the United States began in 1905, the year her mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, died. Ann Jarvis had been a peace activist who cared for wounded soldiers on both sides of the American Civil War and created Mother's Day Work Clubs to address public health issues. Anna Jarvis wanted to honor her mother by continuing the work she started and to set aside a day to honor all mothers because she believed a mother is "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world".

In 1908, the U.S. Congress rejected a proposal to make Mother's Day an official holiday. By 1911, owing to the efforts of Anna Jarvis, all U.S. states observed the holiday with some of them officially recognizing Mother's Day as a local holiday (the first being West Virginia, Jarvis' home state, in 1910). In 1914, Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation designating Mother's Day, held on the second Sunday in May, as a national holiday to honor mothers.
