I would like to talk to you about the turmoil that is encroaching on our time and lifestyles. Masks can be rather annoying. Sometimes when I am talking, I feel like I'm swallowing a mouth full of cotton. I still wear one and I strongly encourage all of you to wear a mask when you go out among other people. It is for your own good and the good of others. Social distancing is extremely difficult at church, family events and gatherings. Cathy and I struggled with this when we attended a family wedding and I've seen people struggle with it at the weddings and funerals at which I officiated. I do not believe that masks and social distancing will become a new normal, but for now they are important, just like frequent handwashing, staying mostly at home, virtual meetings, Zoom Bible Studies and online worship. We may not like enduring these things, but they are for the best. My concern is that some of you are beginning to feel fatigued, depressed, isolated, lonely, fearful or just uncomfortable with the world. My message to you is that the Lord is with you and will continue to be with you.



We also consider all who live by faith, who have been baptized, as being saints. This is not to say that they have distinguished themselves as special, but are understood as simultaneously saints and sinners; saints because of what Jesus has done for them and sinners because they fail to love and they fail to obey God's law.

All Saints Day is a day not only to celebrate those who have died in the faith, but also our own place among God's children. On November 1, we will remember as a part of our service all the saints who have gone to be with the Lord.

News from Our Health Minister, Doris Sterner

"There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends."

How much thought have you given to how you can help others? Organ and tissue donation is one way to offer help. It can be as simple as donating a pint of blood every six months or as complicated as donating a kidney to a relative. Even at death you have an opportunity to share life-giving measures since thousands of people across the country wait every day for another chance at life through organ donation.

Through multiple tissue and organ donation, one donor has the potential to help from one to over 35 people. Some common organs that are removed include the heart, eyes, skin, bones, liver, lungs, kidneys and veins. The people waiting for these organs suffer from conditions like heart disease, kidney disease, cancer or accident reconstruction surgery, corneal damage, incurable lung diseases and even curvature of the spine. A donation of bone, tissue or organ is their only chance at a better quality of life.

Although approximately 90% of Americans say they support organ donation, waiting lists continue to grow because the availability of organs and tissue is extremely low. Only 35% of those who support organ donation have taken steps to do so and about a third of them do not donate because of family dissention or misunderstandings. There's no age limit to donation. One of the oldest organ donors in the U.S. was age 92. He was a liver donor and saved the life of a 69 year old woman.

Educating people about organ donation is an important part of the solution. If you choose to be an organ donor, discuss it with your family. Help them understand why it is important to you. Act now and become a donor. You can sign up online or in-person at your local motor vehicle department. Talk with your family today about this important act of faith, hope and love.

WALK YOUR TALK

"You, my brothers and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve one another humbly in love."

As with many people, I am guilty of acting impulsively in a time of anger or frustration, rather than taking the time to cool down and think about the consequences of my potential actions. I think it's a natural reaction to have a fight or flight response when it comes to confrontation, although God has given us free will to change how we respond to certain situations.

Ultimately, when his very life was in the balance, he willingly gave Himself up for us by being put to death on a tree. The least we can do is honor his choice and precious gift of salvation to us.

I think it is so important that we chose to react in love no matter what, because if we react in hatred and anger, it will only harm us and not the person who has done wrong. Even if we do react in anger and have a vengeful attitude towards someone initially, we should, if at all possible, apologize. It's not easy to "walk our talk" as Christians, but ultimately, it is worth every single GOOD decision we do make in God's name. We have free will, yes, but we should react according to the most important of biblical principles, which is **LOVE**.

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
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We Salute Our Veterans

It was on the 11th hour, of the 11th day, of the 11th month in 1918 when the world agreed to halt all hostilities during World War I. When the war ended less than one year later, it was President Woodrow Wilson who declared November 11 to be known in the US as Armistice Day. The word armistice means to have a truce or cease fire. It became quite the celebration with parades and public gatherings to commemorate the day. Then in 1926, Con-



gress passed a resolution that the "recurring anniversary of November 11, 1918 should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayer and exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding between nations." While 27 states had already made November 11 a legal holiday, it wasn't until 1938 that it officially became a Federal holiday "dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be hereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day'".

In 1954, the 83rd Congress amended the 1938 Act which had made Armistice Day a holiday. They wanted to remove the word Armistice and instead honor all veterans. It was on June 1, 1954, that President Dwight D. Eisenhower declared it Veterans Day for all Americans who have served their country. To this day, the United States shows honor and respect by holding an official wreath-laying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Solider in the Arlington National Cemetery.

Veterans Day should not be confused with Memorial Day. Memorial Day is for those who have served our country and died; thus we hold them in memory. Veterans Day serves as a reminder for all of us to pay tribute to and to thank all of the men and women, both alive or dead, who bravely served our country, protecting our freedoms and rights during war or peacetime.
