# HOLY WEEK WORSHIP SERVICES



# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Holy Week begins this month. It is the central week of the Christian faith! On April 1, Maundy Thursday, we remember the Last Supper of our Lord. On that day, Jesus gave us the gift of Holy Communion, on that day Jesus was betrayed, on that day Jesus was denied, and on that day, Jesus began his walk of suffering leading to his execution. It is both a wonderful and painful day for us to remember, but it is so very important that we remember and celebrate it. That day was lived out by Jesus for you and for me; that day was for the good of all humanity. In Holy Communion, Jesus is present among us, offering us forgiveness and nourishing our faith.

April 2, Good Friday, doesn't seem very good when we think of the horrible events of that day. People, who had just days before proclaimed Jesus' praises, waving palms and shouting "Hosanna", were calling for his execution, his crucifixion. Jesus' disciples went into hiding. The leadership of the Temple of God handed Jesus over to the Roman governor, asking them to crucify Jesus. It didn't seem that Pilate wanted to execute Jesus, but the Temple authorities put on the pressure and after scourging Jesus, Pilate ordered Jesus executed. Jesus died on a cross for us, with only his mother, some women and disciples John and Thomas to offer him support. By the end of the day, the curtain of the Temple was torn in half, Jesus' body was taken down from the cross and laid in a tomb. Jesus died so that we may be saved.

### **MONETARY GIVING**

As a pastor, I find discussing people's financial giving extremely uncomfortable. My feeling is that members support the church because they have made a commitment to the church out of love and loyalty and wish to fulfill their commitments. It should not need to be discussed. And yet, it seems that a number of our members are not supporting St. Peter's financially and that this started for many of them when the pandemic began. I wonder if this is an "out of sight, out of mind" kind of thing.

Unfortunately, this has continued into 2021 as our congregation's regular giving for January and February is just under 60% of our budgeted number for those months. We have a \$7,000 deficit already for those two months. We have managed financially without using our investment principle, only because our expenses have been lower than budgeted. I am not asking the members and friends who have stepped up or who are giving more than in the past to give more. Rather, I am appealing to those members who have not been giving. The ministry of St. Peter's needs you. Last year, we benefited (\$20,000+) from a PPP loan offered by the federal government but this year we are not eligible to receive that money. Pray about your financial commitment to St. Peter's. If the ministry of St. Peter's is in your heart, resume your contributions. I encourage you to give some of the stimulus monies you have received if you have no need of it. Thank you.

# News from Our Health Minister, Doris Sterner

# "Beloved, I pray that all may go well with you and that you may be in good health, just as it is well with your soul." - 3 John: 2



In this time of social distancing and avoidance of being indoors with others, polls have shown that many adults have put off seeing their doctors. It might be that you and/or your children have missed important immunizations over the past year. The CDC recently released the 2021 guidance for both adult and childhood vaccinations and immunizations. There is plenty of information in the news about the COVID-19 vaccination. Many of us struggle to get an appointment for the vaccine. Others may be questioning if the vaccines are safe, what side effects can be expected or if a vaccination against COVID 19 is really necessary.

Michael E. Pichichero, MD is a physician scientist at Rochester General Hospital Research Institute and board certified in adult and pediatric allergy/immunology. On March 11, 2021, he writes about understanding the development of the vaccines for COVID 19. He states, "these vaccines were developed at "warp speed"-that doesn't mean they were developed without all the same safety safeguards that the Food and Drug Administration requires. The reason it happened so fast is because the seriousness of the pandemic allowed us, as a community, to enroll the patients into the studies fast. In a matter of months, we had all the studies filled. In a normal circumstance, that might take 2 or 3 years. And all of the regulatory agencies-the National Institutes of Health, the FDA, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention-were ready to take the information and put a panel of specialists together and immediately review the data. No safety steps were missed." Dr. Pichichero further states, "The novelty of these vaccines was that they could be made so quickly. Messenger RNA type of vaccines (Pfizer & Moderna) [which have been used for the last 10 years] can be made in a matter of days and then manufactured in a matter of 2 months. The DNA vaccines (Johnson & Johnson) has a similar timeline trajectory."

The Mayo Clinic reports that in order to receive emergency use authorization, a biopharmaceutical manufacturer must have followed at least half of the study participants for at least two months after completing the vaccination series and the vaccine must be proven safe and effective in that population. In addition to the safety review by the FDA, the Advisory Committee on Immunization convened a panel of vaccine safety experts to independently evaluate the safety data from the clinical trial. Currently, more than 68 million people in the US and 244 million people worldwide have already received the messenger RNA vaccines. This gives us a lot of data that supports the safety and effectiveness of these vaccines.

# The Church Is Entering into Its 250th Year of Ministry

As winter changed to spring, the thoughts of those who were determined to establish a church in the "Pikelands" (on the south side of French Creek) turned toward the questions of "Where?" and "How?" This would be no small feat. They were mostly farmers and money was not readily available, but they managed to find an acre and a quarter of land up on a hill that they could purchase from Michael King and Henry Hipple. The actual purchase took place on May 16, 1771. Currently, that land is the location of the cemetery which sits between St. Peter's UCC Pikeland and St. Peter's Lutheran. Our records, and those of Rev. Muhlenberg, describe the building which was eventually built as having the capacity to seat 500 people. The planning for such a structure and the actual building of St. Peter's Lutheran Church did not happen in a short time span. It would take them a year and a half to build this church. I did not find any records describing the construction work of the church, but it is likely that they themselves built the building. After its dedication, this church was described by Rev. Muhlenberg as a log church.

The spring of 1771 would have been a time of planning and dreaming. They looked forward to not having to cross French Creek to worship the Lord, especially in the winter and after heavy rains.
