#### ASH WEDNESDAY AND LENTEN SERVICES

Everything is different, it seems and that is very unsettling for the largest majority of us. But God, through these differences, is giving us a way to continue moving forward. A question was asked among our clergy Bible study group, "What we will do with Ash Wednesday? Is it safe for the imposition of ashes?" Most thought that it was safe, with care procedures taken. Then came the question of "How do we provide ashes to the virtual community following on Facebook?" In the service when we put ashes on each person's forehead, I say the words, "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return." The ashes are a reminder of this; they are a symbol. Traditionally, the leftover palms from the year before are burned to produce the ashes. A suggestion was to have those participating virtually use potting soil ("Remember you are dust..."). It was thought that each person could dip their finger in a little oil (olive oil or a cooking oil) and then in the dirt and

make the sign of the cross on their foreheads; or in the case of family situations, put the sign of the cross with the oil and dirt on each other. I tried it and it won't be pretty, but we are not doing this to make a fashion statement. I will send out a Zoom invitation and a service bulletin for Ash Wednesday.

Lenten soup supper and devotionals can continue virtually. Cathy and I have occasional dinners with friends and family, virtually. There is no reason why we can't put together a soup dinner at home and participate in the devotions, just as we would do if we were meeting in church on Thursdays in Lent. Look for the service format and scheduling information after Ash Wednesday.

The season of Epiphany ends on February 7 and we will move on to Lent. Epiphany is the season of the church year that is probably the least understood. The word "epiphany" comes from a Greek word meaning manifestation. Epiphany is very often associated with the arrival of the wise men to Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus. The light of an unusual star led them to Jesus. The church understands Epiphany as God directing the wise men to Jesus by that star and so shining his light on Jesus, revealing Jesus, Israel's infant king, the Christ (God's Son), to these wise men, who are thought to



have been non-Jews (Gentiles). Whether or not the wise men were really Gentiles is not as important as the understanding that Jesus came for all people. Most of us are descended from Gentiles, not Jews. Our place was set for us beginning with the visit of these wise men. Of course, there are other stories that demonstrate God's love and welcome of Gentiles in Scripture, but this takes place at the beginning of Jesus' story. Gentiles were not an add on.

#### PASTOR'S 2020 REPORT

The year 2020 was not what we expected. Three months into the year, the pandemic hit and church life and our individual lives all changed. Here at church, we went virtual. Visiting was limited, phone calls replaced many of my visits, meetings and Bible studies were done on Zoom and our services, while live, had just 3-10 people in attendance. All were put on Facebook and then additionally on the church website. My focus was on keeping things as normal as possible while learning how to do things differently, all the while trying to share the good news of Jesus Christ with people who I could not see face-to-face and could not greet with a friendly handshake.

It felt good this summer to be able to worship (rain or shine) outside under our wonderful picnic pavilion. We worshipped outside into October and even had one of our Christmas Eve services in the pavilion, in spite of the wind, rain and cold. I must say that we, as a small church, accomplished a lot, thanks to the extraordinary efforts of some of our members: Mike Derr, Gabriel Rebolla, Kristy Young, Phil Grant, Jay Eckerdt, their families, the choir and Church Council, to highlight a few. Mike figured out what we needed to do to put our services on Facebook using a connection previously established by Rebecca. Gabriel found a way to take individual recordings of choir members and put them together so that they sounded like they had all been singing in the same room. Kristy helped with her organizational skills and creativity. Phil taught Sunday School on a Google feed and provided the foundation for our Zoom Christmas pageant and Jay kept the youth together online. So many people deserve our thanks for keeping St. Peter's moving forward. We were not able to do all the things that we had done prior to the pandemic, but we did what we could. We called for donations to PACS and Good Samaritan Services and we recommended the donation of stimulus checks (where possible) to food cupboards and shelters. We worshipped weekly and continued Sunday School and Bible study. We even had Fellowship Hour on Zoom for a while. My greatest regret is that we were not able to reach, in the same way, those members of our congregation who did not have access to computers and smart phones.

St. Peter's managed well in 2020 and even attracted four people to our worship who have requested membership. The year 2021 is our congregation's anniversary year, marking 250 years of ministry. We are hoping that we will be able to enjoy some in-person celebrations and are planning a series of activities for the year, beginning in autumn and continuing into next year. For these and for furthering the ministry of St. Peter's, we will need your continued support, your volunteer time, your contributions, your skills, your creativity, your prayers and your compassion. I look forward to another year of ministry with you working beside me!

February is Heart Month. NIH's National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute's tip sheet offers 28 Days Toward a Healthy Heart and suggests you try one of these tips each day for a month, then keep up the momentum and make your favorites part of your regular routine.

- Day 01: Call a friend and join the #OurHearts movement.
- Day 02: Make a heart healthy snack.
- Day 03: Schedule your annual physical. Discuss your heart health goals with your doctor.
- Day 04: Squat it out. Do 1 minute of squats.
- Day 05: Sport red today for National Wear Red Day.
- Day 06. Make today a salt-free day. Use herbs for flavor instead of salt.
- Day 07: Visit Smokefree.gov to take the first step to quitting smoking.
- Day 08: Get your blood pressure checked.
- Day 09: Walk an extra 15 minutes today.
- Day 10: Aim for 30 minutes of physical activity today.
- Day 11: Plan your menu for the week with heart-healthy recipes.
- Day 12: Reduce stress using relaxation techniques.
- Day 13: Give the elevator a day off and take the stairs.
- Day 14: Protect your sweetheart's heart. Plan a heart-healthy date.
- Day 15: Swap the sweets for a piece of fruit for dessert.
- Day 16: Stress less. Practice mindful meditation for 10 minutes.
- Day 17: Head to bed with enough time to get a full 7-8 hours of sleep.
- Day 18: Add a stretch break to your calendar to increase your flexibility.
- Day 19: Eat vegetarian for a day.
- Day 20: Share a funny video or joke that makes you laugh.
- Day 21: Dance for 15 minutes to your favorite music.
- Day 22: Call a relative and ask about your family health history.
- Day 23: March in place during commercial breaks to get your heart going.
- Day 24: Get a tape measure and find out the size of your waist.
- Day 25: Ask a family member or neighbor to join you for a walk.
- Day 26: Fill half of your lunch and dinner plates with vegetables.
- Day 27: See how many push-ups you can do in 1 minute
- Day 28: Pay it forward and tell a friend about The Heart Truth (a national education program aimed at preventing heart disease in women and other vulnerable populations).



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#### Stories of Faith in Action 2020-2021

Jessica Craver's feet felt frozen. Recently deployed by ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) to the Lutheran Church in Australia, she'd failed to pack adequate footwear to withstand the continent's harsh winter. Her host mother had noticed. "She set out a basin and washed my feet," Craver said. "What a beautiful sign ... that we are called to serve each other in ways that are uncomfortable." That was four years ago, but Craver, now a nurse in Seattle, said the moment continues to influence her approach to hospitality when she cares for the city's most vulnerable.

Such stories are common among the more than 1,100 YAGM alumni. The program, which recently celebrated 20 years, originated from a partnership with the U.K. volunteer organization Time for God. Since then, it has evolved to include collaborations with ELCA companion churches or organizations in Argentina/Uruguay, Australia, Central Europe, Jerusalem/West Bank, Madagascar, Mexico, Nepal, Rwanda, Senegal and the United Kingdom. And it has a history of influencing future ELCA leaders.

YAGM volunteers are formed by our companion churches and the ELCA during their time in service; they come back to the United States ready to effect positive change within our congregations and U.S. society," said Michael Busbey, Acting Director for Mission Personnel and Leadership Formation. This rings true for Jill Rode, who taught in Thailand through YAGM more than 15

years ago. After her YAGM year, she returned to teach there for 3 1/2 more years. "[During] that YAGM year ... my faith was broken open and put together again. All those years formed the foundation for me to think about seminary," said Rode, now a pastor at St. Anthony Park Lutheran Church, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Although YAGM will pause in sending out young adults during the 2020-21 year due to COVID-19, staff say the future of this program is "very bright." Funded in part by Mission Support, YAGM continues to affect the church through its rich cohort of alumni who are pursuing callings as rostered leaders, educators, farmers, medical professionals, lawyers, camp directors, filmmakers, politicians, social workers, human rights activists and more.

"It really acts as confirmation and affirmation of an individual's call to serve God and welcome our neighbors," Rode said. "YAGM takes this really big world and shrinks it down. People who were once strangers become neighbors and friends."
